Day 1



The Cantacuzino was designed to blend an upscale dining with a cozy and stylish atmosphere, resulting in an eating experience that is romantic and elegant. It sets the mood for an intimate date or other special occasion with your loved one.

Its location in the incredible Cantacuzino Castle and the elegant interior design makes it a unique place in Romania. During the warmer months, you can dine at a table on our outside gorgeous terrace as clouds slowly glide by, pampering the Bucegi Mountain Mass, while the sunset lighting creates a unforgettable ambiance.



Peles Castle—After a 2-hour drive from Bucharest, we arrive at Peles Castle. The air is different than in the city and the castle unfolds before your eyes when walking near its surroundings. The castle was built by the first King of Romania, Carol the 1st, and the architecture features an elegant Neo-Renaissance style. By the time it was finished, Peles Castles had been one of the most beautiful royal summer residences in Europe. Its exterior is guarded by splendid stone sculptures, gardens, and fountains. Inside, there are impressive wood furniture decorations, paintings, and sculptures.



Bran Castle

Surrounded by an aura of mystery and legend and perched high atop a 200-foot-high rock, Bran Castle owes its fame to its imposing towers and turrets as well as to the myth created around Bram Stoker's Dracula.

Built on the site of a Teutonic Knights stronghold dating from 1212, Bran castle was first documented in an act issued on November 19, 1377, giving the Saxons of Kronstadt (Brasov) the privilege to build the Citadel.

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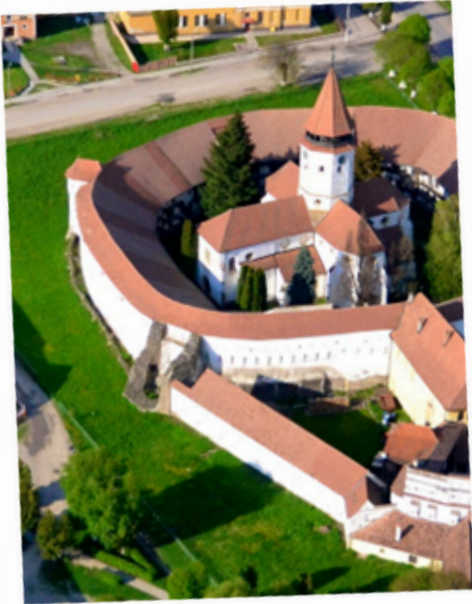
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Day 2



Medieval City of Brasov

Probably the most beautiful city in Romania, Brasov is a unique medieval destination, with a lot of energy, lots to do, and close proximity to nature. Get started in Council Square, where you can admire the colorfully painted houses. Then head to the Black Church, the largest Gothic church in SE Europe. Just a few streets away, you will find Rope Street, one of the narrowest in Europe.



Prejmer – Fortified church

It is one of the most beautiful fortified Saxon churches. Construction began in 1218 by the Teutonic Knights, who laid the foundations of this church. After 1242 it is still built by Cistercians. The church was built in the Burgundian Gothic style and is dedicated to the Holy Cross. Until the 16th century it was a Catholic church, when the Saxons switched to Lutheranism. Today it is an evangelical Lutheran church

Sighisoara

Transylvania is also home to the exquisite medieval town of Sighisoara, a perfectly intact 15th century gem with nine towers, narrow passageways and cobbled streets, burgher houses and ornate churches. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, Sighisoara is also the birthplace of Vlad Dracula, nicknamed Vlad the Impaler (Vlad Tepes), ruler of Walachia from 1456 to 1462. It was Vlad who inspired Bram Stoker's fictional creation, Count Dracula. His house is just one of many attractions here. Others include: the Church on the Hill, with its 500-year-old frescoes; the Church of the Dominican Monastery, known for its Transylvanian Renaissance carved altarpiece, baroque painted pulpit, Oriental carpets and 17th century organ; and the Venetian House, built in the 13th century.



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Day 3



Sibiu

Known in German as Hermannstadt and in Hungarian as Nagyszében, Sibiu has always been the centre of Romania's German minority since medieval times. Even today, it contains Romania's largest German community, and due to initiatives by the local government, the Germanic feel of the area has been maintained.

Today, Sibiu is one of Romania's cultural and tourism capitals, attracting tourists due to its wonderful medieval charm, excellent views of the surrounding landscapes, great food, and stunning parkland. Sibiu today is also doing excellently economically, having an income per capita higher than the Romanian average. Sibiu designated the European Capital of Culture for the year 2007, along with the city of Luxembourg. Formerly the centre of the Transylvanian Saxons, the old city of Sibiu was ranked as "Europe's 8th-most idyllic place to live" by Forbes in 2008.

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
