# Day 1



**The Cantacuzino** was designed to blend an upscale dining with a cozy and stylish atmosphere, resulting in an eating experience that is romantic and elegant. It sets the mood for an intimate date or other special occasion with your loved one.

Its location in the incredible Cantacuzino Castle and the elegant interior design makes it a unique place in Romania. During the warmer months, you can dine at a table on our outside gorgeous terrace as clouds slowly glide by, pampering the Bucegi Mountain Mass, while the sunset lighting creates a unforgettable ambiance.



**Peles Castle**—After a 2-hour drive from Bucharest, we arrive at Peles Castle. The air is different than in the city and the castle unfolds before your eyes when walking near its surroundings. The castle was built by the first King of Romania, Carol the 1st, and the architecture features an elegant Neo-Renaissance style. By the time it was finished, Peles Castles had been one of the most beautiful royal summer residences in Europe. Its exterior is guarded by splendid stone sculptures, gardens, and fountains. Inside, there are impressive wood furniture decorations, paintings, and sculptures.



**Sinaia Monastery** is not to be missed if you visit Sinaia and is located only minutes away from the magnificent Peles Castle. The construction of the Monastery dates back to the seventeenth century, being founded by Bishop Michael Cantacuzino, after he had visited the holy places on the pilgrimage. The monastery proved to be home to the large number of monks living in the Bucegi Mountains, in addition to its role of guard and defense fortress. If we were to look at it from above, it really looks like a city! It was precisely because of the large number of monks who were to be housed here that the necessity of building additional rooms as well as a new church.

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# Day 2



## Medieval City of Brasov

Probably the most beautiful city in Romania, Brasov is a unique medieval destination, with a lot of energy, lots to do, and close proximity to nature. Get started in Council Square, where you can admire the colorfully painted houses. Then head to the Black Church, the largest Gothic church in SE Europe. Just a few streets away, you will find Rope Street, one of the narrowest in Europe.



## Bran Castle

Surrounded by an aura of mystery and legend and perched high atop a 200-foot-high rock, Bran Castle owes its fame to its imposing towers and turrets as well as to the myth created around Bram Stoker's Dracula.

Built on the site of a Teutonic Knights stronghold dating from 1212, Bran castle was first documented in an act issued on November 19, 1377, giving the Saxons of Kronstadt (Brasov) the privilege to build the Citadel.

Although Stoker never visited Transylvania, the Irish author relied on research and his vivid imagination to create the dark and intimidating stomping ground of Count Dracula, leading to persistent myths that it was once the home of Vlad Tepes, ruler of Walachia. While the association with Dracula is sketchy at best, the castle continues to hold a strong attraction for all fans of the Count.

From 1920 to 1948 Bran served as royal residence, a gift of the people of Brasov to Queen Marie of Romania. The castle is now a museum open to tourists, displaying art and furniture collected by Queen Marie.



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
